## **ADULT SENTENCING & RELEASE GUIDELINES**

The 2016 Adult Sentencing & Release Guidelines incorporated both the directives and principles of House Bill 348, Justice Reinvestment Initiative ("JRI"). The primary targets of the 2016 revisions were to: 1) maintain the long term policy goals of JRI; 2) address initial implementation concerns specific to the guidelines; 3) relabel, rename, and renumber forms for greater clarity, sequencing, and ease of use; 4) incorporate a comprehensive crime listing into Addendum B; and 5) incorporate data and research into the aggravating and mitigating factors listed in the Guidelines.

In 2017, the primary targets of revisions were to: 1) maintain the long-term policy goals of JRI; 2) revise criminal history scoring; 3) relabel, rename, and renumber forms for greater clarity, sequencing, and ease of use; 4) incorporate updated

Response and Incentive Matrix (RIM) tools.

## TRAINING & EDUCATION

Statewide Training on the 2016 and 2017 Revisions to the Adult Sentencing & Release Guidelines continued. Several separate training sessions were held throughout the state with representatives of Department of Corrections, Institutional Operations and Adult Probation & Parole; Salt Lake County Probation; Salt Lake Legal Defenders: Utah Correctional Association; Utah Sheriffs Association; Judicial Conferences; the University of Utah College of Law; and the Utah State Bar.

Representatives of the Sentencing Commission also participated in the smarter sentencing conferences organized by the Administrative Office of the Courts. These conferences convened teams of judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, probation and parole officers, and others to receive training on evidence-based sentencing and then perform practical exercises together. Feedback from the conferences was extremely positive and more Smarter Sentencing conferences are planned for 2018.

The Sentencing Commission's website was fully updated in 2017, including PowerPoint presentations, interactive eforms, and interactive links in the guidelines themselves to the underlying research and data. Please contact

## LEGISLATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Misdemeanor Subcommittee of the Sentencing Commission developed several legislative recommendations that are anticipated to be senate bills in the 2018 Legislative Session. These include a bill to clarify that indigent defendants facing misdemeanors must be offered appointed counsel, a bill to render the default penalty for an unspecified misdemeanor an infraction instead of a class B misdemeanor, a bill to revise the theft statute for clarity, and a bill to remove the separate misdemeanor charge for failure to appear.

The Sentencing Commission convened a working group to specifically address concerns regarding expungements in 2016. After coordinating with other interested groups, the proposal was revised and is anticipated to be a senate bill in the 2018 Legislative Session. When a person has criminal charges against them dismissed without prejudice, they cannot get the criminal filings removed from publically accessible databases until the statute of limitation runs. This means that criminal case filings, which are not evidence of quilt. can prevent a person from gaining employment or housing for significant amounts of time. The working group has proposed a bill to delink the person's name from the case filings in the publically available databases so that the filings can only be searched by someone who has the case

number. This will allow law enforcement to track the cases and the individuals, but will make it more difficult for landlords or employers to unfairly use criminal case filings as a basis to deny housing or employment.

#### MEMBERSHIP CHANGES

After many years of distinguished service as the Executive Director of the Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice, Ron Gordon has moved on to be general counsel for the Governor. He will be greatly missed at the Sentencing Commission and the CCJJ. Kim Cordova was confirmed by the Senate in December to be the new Executive Director of the CCJJ. She will take Ron's place on the Sentencing Commission beginning in January of 2018.

In December, the Senate also confirmed Judge Camille Neider to be a district court judge in the Second District. The Utah State Bar has not yet selected a successor for Judge Neider's vacancy.

Paul Boyden, the representative for the Statewide Association of Prosecutors is retiring. His replacement will be announced soon.

Darin Carver will also be leaving the Sentencing Commission. The Governor has not yet appointed a successor for Darin.


The Sentencing Commission extends its sincere thanks to those who are no longer serving on the Commission and
