<p><b>Description:</b> H.B. 79 from 2012 General Session was not considered due to the problem of finding appropriate language. The concept has merit and deserves further investigation and study. Trying to capture suspects using electronic devices. There may be a loop hole in the law where the offender does not follow through with the intent to meet with the child to complete the act. Law requires two criminal elements of intent, with one being “engaging in the conduct.” Will continue to draft potential language to amend the statute.</p> <p><i>[Action: No action taken, discussion only.]</i></p>

<b>Description:</b>	Discussion on increasing alcohol licenses by 90 for restaurants, adds funding for additional law enforcement, and adds an increase in license fees. The legislation will be discussed during the Special Session.  <i>[Action: Passed out as a Committee Bill.]</i> <i>[Action: Enrolled copy prepared.]</i>
<b>Bill Title/Subject Matter:</b>	<b>Media Sales to Minors When Original Content Rating is Altered</b>

<b>Description:</b>	Rep. Kiser brought the topic of media sales to minors to the committee to determine who the stakeholders will be if he opens a bill file. He explained that DVD's are re-distributed as director's cut with a Non-Rating when the original may have been rated an "R." Because there is an "NR" (non-rating) associated with the DVD, sales to minors are occurring.  <i>[Action: No action taken, discussion only.]</i>

<b>Description:</b>	Proposing technical clean up on S.B. 195 Transportation Safety Revisions bill that passed during the 2012 General Session. The proposed bill will have additional definitions, including a definition of <i>careless walking</i> . Purpose is not to cite for careless walking, but to use as a tool to educate people.  <i>[Action: Sen. Mayne made a motion to have the staff continue with the proposed language and then make the legislation a Committee Bill. Motion failed.]</i>
<b>NATURAL RESOURCES, AGRICULTURE, AND ENVIRONMENT</b>	
<b>Bill Title/Subject Matter:</b>	<b>Boating Amendments</b>

<b>Description:</b>	Provides that the operator of a motorboat may not exceed a wakeless speed while a person is riding upon certain portions of the motorboat (class C misdemeanor).  <i>[Action: Sen. Davis made a motion to support the legislation and make it a Committee Bill. Rep. Ivory made a substitution motion to continue studying the bill and move forward as a study item. Passed unanimously.]</i>
