Agenda Item:	Welcome and Approval of Minutes – Douglas Bodrero
Notes:	Chair Doug Bodrero welcomed everyone and asked for changes to the February 8, 2000 minutes. After receiving no suggested changes, Mike Spanos made a motion to approve the minutes. Craig Dearden seconded. The motion was unanimously approved.

Agenda Item:	Cooperative Agreement Between CCJJ and the Governor's Council for People With Disabilities – Camille Anthony
Notes:	Camille Anthony reports that it is anticipated that Glenn Gleave will sign the Agreement today. Senator Hillyard filed a bill to create a new USAAV entity under CCJJ to deal with mentally retarded individuals. Once the Agreement is signed, Senator Hillyard will pull the bill. The Agreement will create a subcommittee under CCJJ and a member of this subcommittee will be a non-voting participant of CCJJ. In addition, a member of CCJJ will also be a member of the new subcommittee.

Agenda Item:	Budgets – Dave Walsh
Notes:	Dave Walsh presented the budget bulletin comparison between the Governor and Legislature. He indicated that currently there are approximately \$9.0 million of unfunded needs.

Agenda Item:	Community Safety Position Statement Regarding Firearms – Doug Bodrero
Notes:	Doug Bodrero presented CCJJ’s Executive Committee’s Community Safety Position Statement Regarding Firearms. The Executive Committee struggled on whether to address each weapons related bill or to draft a position paper. After much consideration, the Executive Committee elected to draft the one-page position paper that was distributed to the Commission for their comments and approval. This paper contains general principles that enhance community safety. It was suggested that the position paper be distributed to the House and Senate leadership, the Governor, and to be posted on CCJJ’s website. Mike Sibbett made a motion to accept the draft Community Safety Position Statement Regarding Firearms as the official position of CCJJ. Georgia Block second. The motion was unanimously approved.

Agenda Item:	Legislation – Ron Gordon
Notes:	<p>Ron Gordon presented the following bills:</p> <p>HB 285: Judicial Conduct Commission. This bill clarifies the process for the Conduct Commission making its orders. Gary Dalton made an amended motion to take <i>no position</i> on this bill. Dave Yocom second. The motion was unanimously approved.</p> <p>SB 221: Sheriff’s classification of jail inmates. Due to concern on whether the sheriff has jurisdiction to release certain prisoners if the jail reaches capacity, the Commission will hold this bill.</p>

HB 106S3 Traffic Stops. This bill relates to obtaining race information from traffic stops. The race information will be coded on individual drivers licenses. Craig Dearden made a **motion** for the Commission to change their position once the bill is amended. Dan Becker second. **The motion was unanimously approved.**

SB 37 Public Schools Surveys Amendments. This bill is receiving significant opposition from the Eagle Forum. The Governor is supportive of this bill. The Commission will continue to support this bill.

Ed McConkie reported that the Hate Crimes Bill was successfully passed in the Senate, but after lack of information, it failed in the House Committee this morning. He indicated that the only group allowed to provide information to the Committee was the Eagle Forum who opposed the bill.

Doug Bodrero indicated that the only issue not addressed during the session is dealing with the tobacco settlement money. Gary Dalton made a **motion** that CCJJ support USAAV's position on tobacco settlement money proposals. Dan Becker second. **The motion was unanimously approved.**

Georgia Block made a **motion** that a notation on the legislative tracking website be added on all weapons-related bills to direct the person to CCJJ's position paper. Senator Hull second. **The motion was unanimously approved.**

Craig Dearden reported that they are waiting for wording changes to be made on the forfeiture bill. The wording *would/should* needs to change *shall* before CCJJ can support. It was noted that CCJJ's Executive Committee continues to have flexibility to change position if wording is changed or amendments made to bills. Georgia Block made a **motion** to support the Executive Committee's positions. Gary Dalton second. **The motion was unanimously approved.**
