

Utah's 2010 Title II Formula Grants

Background: These grants are funded through the Title II Formula Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to create new and effective delinquency prevention/intervention programs. Projects may receive up to four years of declining funds.

<i>South Salt Lake City/ SSLC Substance Abuse Prevention</i>	Serve 60 children and youth, grades K-6, in the Lincoln Elementary catchment area, and their families for 38 weeks (coinciding with the school year) with 3 model programs- Too Good for Drugs and Violence (K-6), SSL Police Athletic/Activities League (PAL), and the Strengthening Families Program. http://www.ssl.state.ut.us/parks/youth.html	2	\$37,500
<i>Center for Family/Development Choices</i>	Serve 30 youth in Salt Lake County who are on probation for sex related crimes. Probationers will attend CFD's out-patient program as a means of meeting court treatment requirements.	2	\$68,400
<i>Community Center/Boys & Girls Club of Green River/ Too Good for Drugs</i>	<i>Too Good for Drugs</i> teaches students that they are too good for drugs and equips them with the knowledge, skills and attitudes needed to remain drug-free. The program is based on the latest research about resiliency, risk and protective factors, and developmental assets-factors which research has identified as critical for young people's successful growth and development. The program provides students with the proactive support, positive role models and high expectations that research has shown to be the building blocks of healthy development. Will serve 133 students.	2	\$41,326
<i>Colors of Success Connections</i>	Target 50 minority youth in the Park City area who are 1 st & 2 nd time offenders to participate in a 12 week, 2-hour session, life skills curriculum. Examine the youth & parents cultural competencies, identify & confront personal resistance, anger & fears that impact their experiences in the community. Coordinates with juvenile court, JJS & other referral agencies.	2	\$52,490
<i>Juvenile Justice Services Uintah Basin Area Youth Services</i>	Partnering with the Ute Tribe & local school district, the program will provide outreach services to 15-20 at-risk Native American and 8-10 female students on a monthly basis, in the form of group and individual counseling. Utah's 2009 Title V Community Prevention Grants

Background: Funded through the Title V Community Delinquency Prevention Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Grants may only be made to units of local government and are limited to 3 years of funding. Subgrantees must complete OJJDP training and community needs assessments to qualify for this grant.

Utah's FY 2010 Gang Mini-Grants

Background: These grants are funded by the State of Utah for projects aimed at reducing gang activity. Projects are funded on a year-to-year basis at a maximum of \$20,000.

<i>Colors of Success Reaching One</i>	Targets minority, at-risk gang involved females or at-risk for gang involvement living in S.L. County, specifically, Glendale and Rose Park. Participants, as well as the peer mentors, will 11-17 years old. The "Girls Circle" program "Paths to the Future" curriculum will be used. Each girl will be paired with a peer mentor for one year. 15 mentors and 30 mentees will be served. http://www.colorsofsuccess.com	\$20,000
<i>NeighborWorks Salt Lake Mestizo Youth ArtWorks</i>	Provide 32 youth the opportunity to enhance their leadership skills and engage in training and activities about diversity, cultural and self-identity issues through art and other forms of expression. This is done through 144 five-hour sessions held throughout the summer and school year. These youth will be employed by NeighborWorks Salt Lake and participate in Mestizo Youth ArtWorks during a three-month program period. http://www.nwsaltlake.org	\$20,000
<i>Big Brothers Big Sisters of Utah BBBS Mentoring</i>	Create 27 new quality mentorship pairs in Summit, Wasatch, Washington, Davis and Weber County using the BBBSU community-based mentoring program. http://www.bbbsu.org	\$10,000
<i>Boys & Girls Clubs of Weber-Davis Teens Mentoring Youth</i>	35 Teen Keystone Club students to mentor 150 students from elementary and middle/junior high schools. Strengthens ties to the community and positive peers through approved curriculum (e.g. Smart Moves, Targeted Outreach, Leaders in Training, Wise Guys, etc.). <i>City of South Salt Lake P.A.L. Boxing Center at Granite High</i>	Initiate a youth boxing center in Granite HS focusing on prevention of gang involvement. Serve 100 youth with Police Athletic League program.	\$20,000

Utah's FY 2008 Juvenile Accountability Block Grants

Background: These grants are funded through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency to improve accountability within the juvenile justice system. The Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice makes grant funding decisions. The bulk of the grant funds are retained by the state to improve the juvenile justice system. There is no funding time limitation for these grants.

<i>Division of Juvenile Justice Services/</i> Graduated Sanctions/Community Programs	Covers the placement costs of approximately 16.5 “medium level of care” and “highest level of care” placement slots (including juvenile sex offenders) over a period of 6 months (Oct.1, 2007 – March 31, 2008). Calculations show that the average daily placement cost is about \$125 per day. The total amount of this grant will purchase approximately 3,025 placement days. Out-of-state placements are expected to comprise over 50% of the total paid placements.	\$273,130
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Court Programs Evaluation & Improvement	Develop a continuous outcome evaluation and quality improvement process to create and maintain state supervision programs that are effective and efficient at holding juvenile offenders accountable while reducing recidivism. Additionally, the project will train 50 staff about evidence-based practices. Fifteen managers will be trained on program management to effectively integrate this new approach in their local court district.	\$60,000
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Delinquency Guidelines Model Court	The juvenile court will continue to support the efforts of Third District and Fourth District in the implementation and results tracking of the Delinquency Model Courts. There are already results in Salt Lake that show the time to disposition can be cut in half. Obviously, getting juveniles into court quicker cuts down the building of additional referrals until the court can hold an offender accountable for pending delinquent behavior.	\$38,245
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> PO/DPO Safety and Management Training	Deliver 13 safety training classes to POs and DPOs that includes non-violent crisis intervention, searches, handcuffing, transporting, and other safety issues. Also, train 90 managers on evidence based practices and survival skills for middle management. Evaluate the effectiveness of trainings provided.	\$98,875
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Juvenile Court Report Card	A Report Card to the Community outlining the progress of Juvenile Court in reaching benchmarks of performance including: re-offense rates, community service hours ordered and completed, restitution owed and paid, drug and alcohol use among probationers, or similar measures of progress. The report will be disseminated through newspaper publications, brochures, and the internet.	\$19,000
