

Utah's FFY 2013 Title II Formula Grants

Background: These grants are funded through the Title II Formula Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to ensure the State's compliance with the core requirements of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act 1974. Projects may receive up to three or four years of declining funds.

<i>Juvenile Justice Services/ JJDP Act Compliance Monitoring</i>	Monitor Utah's compliance with three core protections of JJDP Act: 1) sight & sound separation, 2) deinstitutionalization of status offenders, and 3) jail removal. <i>Juvenile Justice Services/ Juvenile Jail Removal</i>	Funds ensure that minors are not locked up in adult facilities. Provides funding to transport youth detained by police to juvenile facilities and ensures Utah's compliance with the Jail Removal core protection of the JJDP Act. http://www.hsdyc.utah.gov/index.htm	On-going	\$26,000

Process and outcome evaluations will continue to be conducted on all direct service programs. 4. Disseminate evaluation result to UBJJ, grantees and other interested parties. 5. <i>City of South Salt Lake K-6 Delinquency Prevention*</i>	Serve children and youth, grades K-6, in the Roosevelt Elementary catchment area for 38 weeks (coinciding with the school year) through delivery of four model programs- Positive Action, Too Good for Violence (K-6), the South Salt Lake Police Athletic/Activities League (PAL) PAL/PALEE peer tutoring program, and Strengthening Families Program. <i>Community Education Partnership of WVC Project StepUP</i>	Project StepUP will: 1) identify at-risk minority youth and provide them with effective preventative services; 2) identify at-risk families and provide them with parenting classes, and short term solution based therapy, designed to increase parent and family involvement, as well as a reduction in negative behaviors and interactions; and 3) continue the newly developed afterschool program designed to prevent delinquency using evidence based practices. <i>Refugee & Immigrant Center, Asian Assoc. of Utah</i> Refugee Family & Academic Support	Use the All Children Excel model to strengthen the family and school bonding among refugee and immigrant youth. Objectives: increase school success, school commitment; opportunities for pro-social interactions, and positive family management; and decrease negative social interactions and behaviors. The program activities include drop-out case management services, family crisis intervention, academic assistance, parent support and information, and social skills building. Program will serve at-risk youth and families from refugee and immigrant population. Youth participants are in 7th grade through high school, between 11 and 17 years of age. Title V Delinquency Prevention Grant

Background: Funded through the Title V Community Delinquency Prevention Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Grants may only be made to units of local government and are limited to 36 months.

Grantee / Program Title	Program Description	Year	Grant \$
Ogden City Gang Prevention	Program will reach 350 5 th grade students in the Ogden School District with gang prevention education. A school-based curriculum, consisting of 6 lessons reviewing topics such as gang graffiti, how gang activity affects the family, the consequences of getting gang tattoos, gangs and crime, resisting peer pressure to join a gang, future opportunity preparation, and alternatives to gang membership. Faculty trainings will be offered to all schools within the district with at least 250 faculty and staff members receiving gang prevention education. Parent education in the form of neighborhood meetings where parents are taught about the warning signs of gang involvement and how to keep their children out of gangs will be held quarterly throughout the community. The project will also refer and assist families to connect with pro-social after school activities for 4-9th grade youth.	1	\$80,698

2014 Gang Reduction Grant

Background: Funded by the Utah State Legislature. Grants may only be made to units of local government utilizing the OJJDP Gang Reduction Model.

Grantee / Program Title	Program Description	Year	Grant \$
Ogden City School District Community Involvement, Reentry, Opportunities, Social Suppression (CROSS)	CROSS serves the highest-risk (indicated) and adjudicated juveniles (ages 14-21) involved in gang activity; live in Ogden City; and are referred to the by Juvenile Justice Services, Juvenile Court, and Ogden City School District's Student Services. CROSS utilizes a researched based model, Risk Need Responsivity (RNR) to develop individualized case management plans that uses the Protective Risk Assessment as the participant evaluation tool. <i>Why Try</i> cognitive behavioral training and evidenced based motivational interviewing techniques are the core curriculum. It partners with community agencies to address pro-social involvement, academic achievement, career readiness and family involvement. CROSS social workers will each manage a caseload of 20-25 adolescents for a minimum of 12 weeks for school referred participants and 16 week for court referred participants with follow-up being continued up to a year. A steering committee of community organizations will oversee CROSS to provide guidance, direction, and approval for all program fiscal decisions and program activities, including monthly expenditures and additional resources. Utah's Current Juvenile Accountability Block Grants

Background: These grants are funded through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency to improve accountability within the juvenile justice system. The Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice makes grant funding decisions. There is no funding time limitation for these grants. All are statewide.

<i>Division of Juvenile Justice Services/</i> Graduated Sanctions & Community Programs	Covers the placement costs of approximately 3,810 residential placement days that typically cost about \$100 per day. "The 3,810 placement days will essentially provide the equivalent of 41 youth being in community placement.	\$342,925
<i>Division of Juvenile Justice Services/</i> In-Home Community Observation & Assessment	Twenty-four to thirty-two youth will be court ordered into the temporary custody of JJS for a period not to exceed 45 days to participate in Observation and Assessment. JJS will evaluate the youth and family for appropriateness and compliance with the In-Home Community Observation and Assessment program. The program is intended to reduce the number of youth placed out-of-home and reduce their pre-service wait times in detention while maintaining the quality of O&A assessment services that they receive.	\$72,000
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Continuous Program Evaluation Improvement & Implementing Evidence Based Practices	Juvenile Court will continue to implement the Correctional Program Checklist (CPC) for all contracted programs that have a sufficient number of court-referred youth. In addition to the CPC, this project will continue to develop the knowledge base of court staff through attendance at national conferences. The information gained at these conferences will be used to enhance research support provided to programs and to update Juvenile Court management on best practices. A one-day CARE Summit will be held for approximately 500 Juvenile Court staff throughout the state to address such areas as e-filing, case planning management, sharing electronic records, ensuring quality documents, and adapting to changes in system policy and practice.	\$85,500
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> PO/DPO Safety and Management Training	Train over 150 new and existing staff on policy matters, safety issues, and de-escalation techniques. The RESTA Conference will train over 60 staff and supervisors on work crew safety. Train over 120 managers on leadership issues. The training on Carey Guides, risk assessments, and evidence based practices will train over 100 staff and supervisors. The training on electronic records will train stakeholders such as staff, judges, attorneys, community partners, and private providers on the technology, methods, and procedures needed to transition to an electronic based record system. In addition, management staff members will attend national conferences such as the American Probation & Parole Association Conference to remain current with the best practices in the field.	\$138,180
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Interstate Compact for Juveniles	The purpose of the compact is to facilitate the movement of youth amongst states for their supervision and return runaway youth to their home states. Approximately 300 youth compact in and out of the state of Utah on an annual basis. This grant underwrites the dues owed to the national office, forms a state council, and enhances training to staff and law enforcement on the compact process.	\$10,800
